Air Freight Economics

Air cargo improved in May, but a full recovery will take time

Industry-wide cargo tonne-kilometres (CTKs) fell by 20.3% year-on-year in May, a slight improvement from the 25.6% decline seen in April. Seasonally adjusted industry CTKs increased this month, but they remain around 22% below Dec 2019 levels. The rebound was broad-based across the main regions, which all lifted from the April trough. Air freight volumes are on the rise – but forwarders remain concerned about capacity and airport congestion. The latest data from Clive Data Services show June volumes were 6% up on May, while the last week of the month saw volumes 12% higher than the last week of May. US FAA clears airlines to remove passenger seats for cargo

The Federal Aviation Administration gave U.S. airlines permission to remove passenger seats and transport cargo on the floor of the cabin in aircraft being deployed on cargo-only flights. The exemption to existing regulations governing aircraft operations lasts for one year. Read more... Regional DGR virtual training acceptance

In order to maintain the workforce proficiency on DGR related matters, Civil Aviation Authorities of United States, Canada, Honduras, Nicaragua and Peru now recognize virtual/online courses on a permanent basis (conditions may apply). IATA continues working with other countries, including Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile and Colombia who are currently allowing virtual training and certification for limited time. Regulators speed up Advance Cargo Information and e-Cargo adoption

As a result of the COVID crisis, several Regulators see digital processes as a condition for business continuity during exceptional situations:

- **Bolivia:** Customs mandate Cargo-XML data transmission as of September 1, 2020. Should you require any support with this process, contact Olivier

- **Brazil:** IATA strongly recommends airlines to test manifest data transmission through the RFB's training environment and address potential issues to secure implementation in early 2021. More details contact Olivier

- **Peru:** published Legislative Decree DL1492 (only in Spanish), aimed at a 100% digital environment to make of the foreign trade an efficient and transparent process. All industry stakeholders must implement digital documents, risking financial penalties otherwise. IATA, AETAI and ALTA support digitalization and requested the authorities to respect the international conventions and industry standards. More information contact Olivier.
